The National Park Service was established by Congress in 1916 to protect the nation's natural, historical, and cultural resources and to "provide for the enjoyment of the same in such manner and by such means as will leave them unimpaired for the enjoyment of future generations."

NPS manages 390 properties that can be grouped into 19 primary designations, including national parks, historic sites, historical parks, monuments, memorials, battlefields, seashores, lakeshores, recreation areas, and preserves. These properties are located in 49 states and in American Trust territories.

Following the park listings, a subsection entitled "Affiliated Areas" provides information on a variety of locations that preserve significant properties outside the National Park System, but that still draw technical or financial aid from NPS. Location: 3 miles south of Hodgenville, Kentucky, on US 31E and KY 61. Facilities: Picnic area (&), rest rooms (&), visitor center (&), museum/exhibit, boardwalk and hiking trails. Open year round, memorial buildings. Activities: Hiking, educational programs, ranger program. Special Features: An early 19th-century Kentucky cabin, symbolic of the one in which Lincoln was born, is preserved in a memorial building at the site of his birth. The Boyhood Home Unit at Knob Creek Farm was home to Lincoln from the time he was two until he was seven years old.

History: Proclaimed Sieur de Monts National Monument on July 8, 1916; established as Lafayette National Park on February 26, 1919, and renamed Acadia National Park on January 19, 1929. Location: Approximately six hours north of Boston by car. From Boston take I-95 north to Augusta, Maine; from Augusta take Route 3 east to Ellsworth and on to Mount Desert Island or take I-95 north to Bangor, Maine; from Bangor take Route 1A east to Ellsworth; from Ellsworth take Route 3 to Mount Desert Island. Facilities: Campgrounds (ち), picnic areas (ち), rest rooms (ち), carriage roads (45 miles), hiking trails (125+ miles), boat rental, boat ramp, visitor centers, nature center, historical museum. Entrance fee required. Activities: Camping, hiking, bicycling, horseback riding, mountain climbing, swimming, boating, fishing, snowmobiling, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, wildlife viewing, interpretive programs, scenic driving, ice fishing, and dog sledding. Special Features: Acadia was the first national park established east of the Mississippi River. The sea here joins the rugged coastline of Mount Desert Island (highest elevation on the eastern seaboard), picturesque Schoodic Peninsula on the mainland, and the spectacular cliffs of Isle au Haut. Visitors can drive the 27-mile Park Loop Road which includes views of some of the most dramatic scenery along the eastern seaboard.

History: Designated as Adams Mansion National Historic Site on December 9, 1946; changed to Adams National Historic Site on November 26, 1952; redesignated Adams National Historical Park on November 2, 1998. Location: In the City of Quincy, Massachusetts, approximately ten miles south of Boston. All tours begin at the Visitor Center which is located at 1250 Hancock Street in the Presidents Place Galleria. Facilities: Museum/exhibit. Entrance fee

required. A free trolley bus provides regularly scheduled shuttle service between the park visitor center and the historic homes. **Activities:** Regularly scheduled tours of the historic homes (mid-April - mid-November), family-oriented special events program (throughout the year), and annual lecture series (last week in June). **Special Features:** The site includes 11 historic structures detailing the lives of five generations of the Adams family (1720 to 1927), including two US Presidents and First Ladies, three US Ministers, historians, writers and family members. The main historic features include: John Adams Birthplace, where John Adams, the 2nd US President was born (1735), and the John Quincy Adams Birthplace, where his son, John Quincy Adams, 6th US President was born (1767); the Old House, home to four generations of the Adams family; and the United First Parish Church, where both Presidents and the First Ladies are entombed in the Adams family crypt.

Size: 6.6 acres. **History:** In 1991, the remains of more than 400 17th and 18th century Africans were discovered during preconstruction work for a federal building in New York City. Site is part of a seven-acre National Historic Landmark established on April 19, 1993. Designated a National Monument on February 27, 2006. **Location:** In Lower Manhattan, at the corners of Duane and Elk streets, adjacent to the Ted Weiss Federal Building at 290 Broadway. **Special Features:** From the 1690s to the 1790s, the African Burial Ground served as the final resting place of enslaved and free Africans in New York City, New York. It contains the remains of those interred, as well as the archeological resources and artifacts associated with their burials.

Size: 1,371 acres. History: Authorized as Alibates Flint Quarries and Texas Panhandle Pueblo Culture National Monument on August 21, 1965; redesignated November 10, 1978. Location: On the Texas Panhandle, 30 miles north of Amarillo and just southwest of Fritch, off TX 136. Adjoins Lake Meredith National Recreation Area (see separate entry for description). Facilities: Contact station, lake, tours. Activities: Ranger-guided tours of the flint quarries. Special Features: For more than 10,000 years, pre-Columbian Indians dug agatized dolomite from quarries here to make projectile points, knives, scrapers, and other tools. The 736 largely unexcavated quarry pits located within the park reflect a long story of continuous excavation and use. Due to its unique colors and its ability to be chipped (or knapped) into sharp cutting edges, Alibates flint was highly prized and traded extensively throughout much of North America.

Special Features: Site preserves traces of the first railroad crossing of the Allegheny Mountains. Built between 1831-1834, the inclined plane railroad permitted transportation of passengers and freight over the mountains from 1834-1854, providing a critical link in the Pennsylvania Mainline Canal system and an important role in opening the interior of the United States to trade and settlement.

Location: In southwest Texas, west of San Antonio between Del Rio and Langtry. Accessible via US 90 from the east and west and US 277/377 from the north and south. Facilities: Primitive campgrounds (兔), picnic area, rest rooms (兔), groceries, restaurant/snacks, boat rental, boat ramp, self-guided tour/trail, military. Activities: Camping, hiking, horseback riding, swimming, boating, fishing, hunting, water-skiing, scuba diving, interpretive programs, scenic driving. Size: 515 acres. History: Authorized on October 16, 1970. Location: In southwest Georgia, approximately 12 miles north of Americus and 11 miles south of Montezuma on GA-49. Facilities: Picnic area, rest rooms, visitor center, museum/exhibit, self-guided tour/trail, primitive campsite. Activities: Guided tour, audio driving tour. Special Features: Andersonville, or Camp Sumter as it was officially known, was one of the largest of many Confederate military prisons established during the Civil War. During the 14 months of its existence (1864-1865), more than 45,000 Union soldiers were confined here, of which nearly 13,000 died from disease, poor sanitation, malnutrition, overcrowding, or exposure to the elements. Today, Andersonville is the only park in the National Park System to serve as a memorial to all American prisoners of war throughout the nation's history. The park also features the National Prisoners of War Museum and Andersonville National Cemetery.
